The NTWC's yearly activities include:

- Policy response: Conducts analysis of water policies and initiatives that impact Tribes and responds by preparing comment letters, white papers or briefs.
- Information Exchange: Engage and collaborate with national, regional, tribal organizations or working groups.
- Water Priorities: Publish a "<u>Tribal Water Priorities</u>" document that identifies Clean Water Act and Safe
   Drinking Water Act priorities and conduct activities outlined in the document.

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Council members duties include, but are not limited to:

- Participate in monthly virtual calls;
- Attend two in-person meetings annually; and
- Participate and provide feedback in crafting response documents to policy and/or rulemaking actions.

The Council is accepting applications from water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization to fill three (3) vacancies.

## Region 3 Representative

Open to tribal water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization in Region 3 (Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, & West Virginia).

## At-Large Representative (2 vacancies)

Open to tribal water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization in the United States (Regions 1 through 10).

We believe that diverse perspectives are our greatest strength, and we invite new voices to join this rewarding experience. Tribal water professionals with knowledge in the Clean Water Act (CWA) and Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) are encouraged to apply. Also, an applicant with a background in water infrastructure, drinking water, wastewater, and operations and maintenance, is highly encouraged.

The National NPS Biennial Workshop will be held on October 27-29, 2025, in Baton Rogue, Louisiana. This event offers an opportunity for CWA Section 319 state, territorial, and Tribal grantees to convene on national programmatic and knowledge sharing and technical assistance. The national NPS program and planning committee are developing robust Tribal specific sessions, workshops, and networking opportunities. ## EPA Pacific Northwest Tribal Clean Water Act Training, November 17-20, 2025

The training will address Clean Water Act (CWA) programs including Section 106, Section 319, Section 303(d), water quality standards, and wetlands and will be useful to Tribes who work on these programs or are interested in pursuing Treatment in a similar manner as a State (TAS) status for one or more programs. The training workshop is targeted to Tribes who conduct water quality monitoring, issue water quality certifications, and address water quality issues, nonpoint source pollution, and impaired waters/TMDLs. Tribal staff from across the country are invited, although there will be a focus on examples and applications for Tribes in the Pacific Northwest.

# Bureau of Reclamation Native American Affairs Technical Assistance Program Deadline: October 28, 2025

Eligibility: Tribes in 17 Western States (Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming) The Bureau of Reclamation has various programs which provide technical assistance to a broad range of entities, such as the Drought Assistance, Wetlands, and Water Recycling Programs. Indian Tribes are eligible for most of these programs, and, through them, much assistance has been provided to Tribes. One program is available only to federally recognized Indian Tribes—the Native American Affairs Technical Assistance Program (TAP).

Reclamation's Native American Affairs TAP provides technical assistance to assist Indian Tribes to develop, manage, and protect their water and related resources. The program has supported a broad range of activities in each year since its inception in the early 1990s. Such activities have included water needs assessments, improved water management studies, water quality data collection and assessments, and water measurement studies.

# EPA's Effluent Limitations Guidelines and Standards for the Steam Electric Power Generating Point Source Category

Deadline: October 30, 2025

EPA is initiating consultation and coordination with federally recognized Indian Tribes on a proposed rule and companion direct final rule to update the Effluent Limitations Guidelines and Standards for the Steam Electric Power Generating Point Source Category (Steam Electric ELG). The Steam Electric ELG regulations cover wastewater discharges from power plants. The proposed rulemaking specifically focuses on wastewaters generated by coal-fired power plants. These limitations on the discharge of pollutants will subsequently be incorporated into National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits, potentially extending pollutant discharges into waters of the United States for a period of several years.
