Start by researching local radon data

Spokane Indian Reservation

The Spokane Indian Reservation is rich in uranium deposits. We are home to the only uranium mines in Washington State. This natural geology accounts for high levels found in past radon studies.

The USA Today reported in 1991 that, "40% of the 200 homes tested on the Reservation have radon levels several times higher than the national average." A 1990 study done by Housing and IHS found that over 30% of the homes on this Reservation exceeded EPA's recommended action level. The levels ranged from 0.2 to 45.6 pCi/L with an average of 3.83 pCi/L (over 2.5 times higher than the national average).

EPA Map of Radon Zones




Zone 1	Highest Potential (greater than 4 pCi/L)

"Indoor radon is the second-leading cause of lung cancer in the United States and breathing it over prolonged periods can present a significant health risk to families all over the country. It's important to know that this threat is completely preventable. Radon can be detected with a simple test and fixed through well-established venting techniques."—January 2005

What is Radon?



- Pladon is a radioactive element that is a trait, obloriess and odoriess gas derived from the decay of radium, and could be in the soil underneath YOUR HOME.
- Radon is the #1 cause of lung cancer among non-smokers in United States killing 25,000 people per year and rising.
- 21,000 of these deaths occurred among people who had never smoked.
- However, if you do smoke or you are around second hand smoke you increase your chances for developing lung cancer by as much as <u>4 times</u>.

Where Does Radon Come From?

- Radon is the decay product of Radium and part of the long decay chain of Uranium in the earth's crust. It is present in almost all rock, soil and water.
- Radon typically moves up through the ground into the atmosphere entering your home through cracks and other holes in the foundation.
- The amount of radon in soil depends on the soil chemistry, which varies from one house to the next.



Could My Home Have Radon?

- More than half the state of Minnesota is in a zone that has the highest potential risk for elevated radion levels.
- Big, smell, new or old ALL HOMES SHOULD BE TESTED FOR RADON! Regardless of geographic location, zone designation or soil type.
- The only way to be 100% sure that you and your family are not at risk for lung canoer due to high radon levels is to ...

TEST YOUR HOME!

Hcw Do I Test?

- A radon test kit is an effective and easy way to measure the radon level in your home.
- A short term radon test kit set out for 3-7 days will indicate the level of radon in your home. 90 day long term test kits can be used to further assess high radon levels.




 Your radon test results will be reported in Picocuries per Liter of air (pCAL). If your radon level is 4 (pCAL) or higher, you are at unsafe levels. Leech Lake Air Program and EPA recommend you fix your home to bring high levels down to below 4 for habitable and safe conditions.



Long Term Radon Test Kit.



- Spokane Tribe purchased kits in bulk, placed at the Tribal Trading Post with outreach materials
- Reminders and signs throughout the community
- Post-testing follow up

- Incentives! Free CO detector to households who complete a radon test.
