The Council is currently accepting applications from tribal water professionals for an At-Large representative. We are seeking individuals with a background in water infrastructure, drinking water, and operations and maintenance.

## At-Large Representative

Open to tribal water professionals employed by a federally recognized Tribe or tribally authorized organization in the United States (Regions 1 through 10).

## Member duties include, but not limited, to:

- Participating in monthly virtual calls;
- Attending semi-annual in-person meetings; and
- Creating and participating in crafting response documents to policy and/or rulemaking actions.

## Who We Are

The National Tribal Water Council (NTWC/Council) is a technical and scientific body created to assist the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, federally recognized Indian Tribes, Alaska Native Tribes, and their associated tribal communities and tribal organizations, with research and information for decision-making regarding water issues and water-related concerns that impact Indian and Alaska Native tribal members in Indian Country. These water issues include, but are not limited to, surface water, wetlands, nonpoint source pollution, point source pollution, drinking water, groundwater, oceans and estuaries, and underground injection.

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## Membership Information

### Appointment Term

- Council members shall serve **three-year** terms.
- There shall be no prohibition on re-nominating and re-appointing members whose terms are due to expire.

### Qualifications

The following criteria shall be used to determine the qualifications of nominees for membership on the NTWC:

1. Members of the NTWC must have a vocational/professional background and previous or current hands-on water-related expertise in Indian Country.
2. Members of the NTWC must be employed by a federally-recognized Tribe or tribally-authorized organization, and have the support and consent of their employer to participate in the activities of the NTWC. (A tribally-authorized organization must provide adequate documentation of the existence of its authority.)
3. Members must be willing and able to provide oral and written scientific and, as appropriate, culturally-based opinions on water-related issues confronting Indian Tribes and Alaska Native Tribes.
4. Members must be willing to review and discuss water-related issues in Indian Country with a perspective that will enhance the efforts of the NTWC, EPA, Indian Tribes, and Alaska Native Tribes to improve the health and safety of Tribal communities.
5. Members must be willing to faithfully participate in the monthly virtual calls and attend two (2) annual in-person meetings of the NTWC.

6. Members must be willing and able to share information and explain to third parties the goals and purposes of the NTWC.

### **Knowledge and Skills Requirements**

A Council member must:

1. Have good interpersonal, problem-solving, and critical thinking skills.
2. Be a team player, a good listener, and communicator.
3. Have an open mind and the ability to think creatively.
4. Make decisions in a timely and knowledgeable manner.
5. Represent the Council in a professional manner both internally and externally.
6. Have organizational and leadership abilities.
7. Visualize beyond the present, look at the Council as a whole, and make decisions that are in the best interest of federally recognized Indian and Alaska Native Tribes.

### **Key Duties and Responsibilities of the Council**

1. Create and approve position and white papers on issues affecting the Council and Tribal Nations.
2. Develop, implement, and evaluate the NTWC priorities.
3. Cultivate individuals to serve as appointed and elected volunteers of the Council.
4. Perform other such duties in coordination with the EPA.
5. Advocate for the health and sustainability of clean water, and for the productive use of water for the health and well-being of Indian Country, Indian Communities, and Alaska Native Tribes.
6. Raise awareness of a wide range of water related issues pertaining to the health of tribal communities and the quality of tribal aquatic resources and watersheds.
7. Promote information exchange.
8. Facilitate the exposure of tribal water protection program development and implementation.
9. Provide a platform to inform tribes on a wide variety of issues related to ground, surface, and drinking water.
10. Promote community water protection education and awareness.
11. Assist in the development, establishment, and sustainability of comprehensive tribal water protection programs.

*\*\*The NTWC was established to advocate for the best interests of federally-recognized Indian and Alaska Native Tribes, and Tribally-authorized organizations, in matters pertaining to water. It is the intent of the NTWC to advocate for the health and sustainability of clean and safe water, and for the productive use of water for the health and well-being of Indian Country, Indian communities, and Alaska Native Tribes. As such, the NTWC uses its resources to support the efforts of all federally recognized Tribes in protecting and improving the water quality within their respective jurisdictions. Although the organization always seeks to represent consensus perspectives on any given issue, it is important to note that the views expressed by the NTWC may not be agreed upon by all Tribes. Furthermore, interactions with the NTWC do not substitute for government-to-government consultation which can only be achieved through direct communication between the federal government and Indian Tribes.*
