Teacher Input	The teacher will explain the project of the day, reinforcing prior
	vocabulary studied using the Word Wall. She will provide visuals
	such as restaurant posters, large pots and cooking utensils
	(previously labeled), and various types of restaurant
	brochures/flyers so students can see a finished product. The teacher
	will use the blackboard/overhead to explain the items that students
	must include: Title of restaurant with address and phone number,
	types of foods, dress code (if any), and map or directions.
Modeling the	The teacher will demonstrate how to do a brochure by having a pre-

	left blank for the teacher to ask students what to write in it. "What

	with their own ideas of how to develop their own brochure. Also,
	the teacher can have students brainstorm different words that they
	can relate with restaurants and write them on the board.
Check for	As the teacher demonstrates on the overhead, she may ask students
Comprehension	if there is anyone who has seen a flyer/brochure of a restaurant
	before, and have the student explain and describe it to the class.
	Also, the teacher may have a group of students draft a quick

Guided Practice	After demonstrating the example on the overhead, students can
	work in groups to complete a short "fill-in-the-blank" worksheet
	similar to the teacher's overhead copy of a brochure.
Closure	The teacher refers to the words on the board and word wall that
	students may use to create their own restaurant flyer. The teacher

	posts the sample brochures in various places in the classroom for students to see. Lastly, the teacher reviews the parts that should be included in the flyer. (descriptive words, pictures (cutouts of maggringe) location of rectaurant and telephone number samples
