

A Year End Highlight of 2023 NTWC Activities

It has been another productive year for the National Tribal Water Council. A few accomplishments include writing comment letters, collaborating with other tribal partnership groups, and conducting outreach. Below are highlights of the Council's activities, along with the activities of the Tribal PFAS Working Group this past year.

Outreach and Coordination Efforts

- On January 26, 2023, the NTWC conducted an informational webinar on its <u>Guidebook for Developing Tribal</u>
 <u>Water Quality Standards</u>. The webinar panelists included Law Professor Jim Grijalva, NTWC Chairman Ken
 Norton (Hoopa Valley Tribe), Dan Kusnierz (Penobscot Nation), and Yolanda Barney (Navajo Nation). The

- At the invitation of the Association of Clean Water Administrators to their July 13, 2023 meeting, Chairman Norton and Vice Chairman Michael Bolt (Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians) discussed tribal perspectives on EPA's Proposed Rule to Establish Federal Baseline Water Quality Standards for Indian Reservation Waters.
- Chairman Norton invited by Senator Alex Padilla's (CA) office to provide input on tribal drinking water infrastructure and tribal communities. Chairman Norton provided testimony at the Senate Environment and Public Works, Subcommittee on Fisheries, Water, and Wildlife hearing on September 20, 2023, in Washington, D.C. U.S. EPA Finalized Reporting and Recordkeeping Requirements for PFAS under the Toxic Substances Control Act

EPA has finalized the reporting and recordkeeping requirements for Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) under the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA). In accordance with obligations under TSCA, EPA is requiring any person that manufactures (including import) or has manufactured (including imported) PFAS or PFAS-containing articles in any year since January 1, 2011, to electronically report information regarding PFAS uses, production volumes, disposal, exposures, and hazards.

The finalized rule will assist EPA to understand who is using PFAS, how they are being used, and in what quantities. This rule will produce actionable data that can be used by EPA, as well as state, local, and Tribal governments to craft policies and laws that protect people from dangerous "forever chemicals."

CWA Section 401 Water Quality Certification Improvement Rule

On September 14, 2023, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA or the Agency) announced the final 2023 Clean Water Act Section 401 Water Quality Certification Improvement Rule (2023 Rule). The final rule is grounded in the fundamental authority granted by Congress to states, territories, and Tribes to protect water resources that are essential to healthy people and thriving communities over the past 50 years. The final rule will take effect on November 27, 2023.

EPA's National Rivers and Streams Assessment

On December 19, 2023, the EPA released the National Rivers and Streams Assessment (NRSA) that presents the results of the 2018-2019 survey of perennial rivers and streams in the United States. This third collaborative survey examines the health of rivers and streams on a national scale and is designed to provide statistically valid results on the condition of broad regions and other subpopulations. TRIBAL CONSULTATION OPPORTUNITIES

EPA's Proposed Issuance of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Wildfire General Permit under the Clean Water Act

Deadline: January 28, 2024

EPA has initiated consultation and coordination with federally recognized Indian Tribes on the proposed issuance of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Wildfire General Permit (WGP) under the Clean Water Act (CWA). EPA's WGP is a new NPDES general permit that will propose to cover discharges from certain Federal operators to waters of the U.S. from the aerial application of two categories of wildland fire chemicals, long-term fire retardants and water enhancers. The draft WGP will be proposed to have a five-year permit term and cover all areas where EPA is the NPDES permitting authority.

EPA held two identical informational webinars and listening sessions for tribal officials on November 15 and December 5, 2023. The deadline to request one-on-one consultation meetings with the EPA is January 15, 2024.

EPA's Lead and Copper Rule Improvements

Deadline: February 5, 2024

On November 30, 2023, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced the proposed Lead and Copper Rule Improvements (LCRI). EPA invites the public to review the proposed LCRI and supporting information and once published in the *Federal Register*, provide written comments in the public docket associated with this rulemaking at www.regulations.gov, Docket ID Number: EPA-HQ-OW-2022-0801.

EPA held an informational webinar on December 6, 2023. A virtual public hearing is scheduled for **January 16, 2024**, at which the public will be invited to provide EPA with verbal comments.
