

Tribal PFAS Working Group 2024 Priorities



The Tribal PFAS Working Group members reviewed and updated their key priorities for 2024 to reflect the accomplishments in 2023 and what remains to be done to engage tribal communities in recognizing the harmful impacts of PFAS on their lands. The working group has expanded their scope to include other emerging contaminants and the effects of the contaminants, including PFAS, on other environmental media. Thus, the working group identified six (6) key priorities, which include the following:

- Continue to identify tribes and coordinate with tribes that are currently impacted by PFAS.

 The Tribal PFAS Working Group will continue to invite tribal representatives and researchers during the monthly calls to hear testimonials and presentations on how PFAS has impacted tribal lands and resources. Throughout the year, the working group will follow-up with tribes that are impacted by PFAS.
- Continue to develop and identify PFAS tools and resources.
 Develop and identify PFAS tools and resources, such as databases, outreach materials, maps, funding opportunities, and fact sheets to characterize PFAS that will support and allow tribal nations to evaluate their exposure to PFAS.
- Enhance and promote the Tribal PFAS Working Group's webpage with current publications, presentation videos, research, and resources. - Advocate for rulemaking, research, and education actions, with attention to inclusion of tribal lifeways.

Advocate for tribal PFAS work across federal and state agencies, including comment responses to proposed policies and rulemaking actions, research funding opportunities, and science education. Advocate for and ensure that appropriate engagement and consultation with Tribes occurs.

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- Develop and host tribal webinars / workshops on PFAS issues.

EPA Policy on Consultation with Indian Tribes: 2023 Revisions to the Policy and Guidance In December 2023, the EPA revised the EPA Policy on Consultation with Indian Tribes and the companion Guidance for Discussing Tribal Treaty or Similar Rights. The documents were revised in response to the 2021 Memorandum on Tribal Consultation and Strengthening Nation-to-Nation Relationships that required each agency to implement the policies and directives of Executive Order 13175.

TRIBAL CONSULTATION OPPORTUNITIES

EPA's Proposed Rulemaking for Incorporating PFAS Reporting Requirements into NPDES Application Forms

Deadline: April 1, 2024

EPA is initiating consultation and coordination with federally recognized Indian Tribes on a forthcoming proposed rulemaking that seeks to update requirements for several of the existing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit applications to address monitoring and/or reporting of Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS). This rulemaking will consider adding Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances reporting requirements to permit applications for new and existing publicly owned treatment works, new and existing manufacturing, commercial, mining, and silvicultural operations, and stormwater discharges associated with industrial activity.

EPA is holding an informational webinar for Tribal leaders and staff. The webinar will provide Tribes with an opportunity to ask questions and learn more about proposed changes to reporting requirements to incorporate PFAS and will reserve time for Tribal leaders and staff to provide input on areas of the draft rule that may require clarification or change, as appropriate.
