Exposures



- One of 11 federal agencies in DHHS
- Works with other federal, state, local, and tribal agencies
- An independent agency, but
 - CDC performs many of the administrative functions
 - CDC Director serves as the ATSDR administrator



Protecting the public from toxic chemicals

- Focus on hazardous waste sites and releases
- Example: Public Health Assessments

Building the science base on toxic chemicals

- Example: Research on asbestos; Hazardous substances emergency events surveillance
- Educating health professionals and the public
 - Example: Toxicologic Profiles
- Registries



Many ATSDR activities are possible only through partnerships:

- Has an Office of Tribal Affairs
- Close relationship with EPA
- Works at the state, tribal, and local level
 - Offices in all EPA regions
 - Strong community orientation





The National Conversation on Public Health and Chemical Exposures



Vision: Ensure that chemicals are used and managed in ways that are safe and healthy for all people

Goal: Create an action agenda which will help government agencies and other groups protect the public from harmful chemical exposures



- Recognition of many exposure pathways
- Recognition of broad range of health outcomes
- Biomonitoring
- Large numbers of chemicals
- New approaches to toxicity testing
- Environmental justice
- Green chemistry
- Recognition of the need to better coordinate with tribes on these issues







