



Annex F - Chemical Countermeasures

- Public comment period and Tribal Consultation with tribes in the 5 Subareas with crude oil transiting via vessel in 2013/2014.
- When final, 2-year process to identify additional areas to be excluded from pre-authorization.








An example of the Diversion Booming Tactic. Actual deployment should be adjusted for local conditions.
