

Caddo County, Oklahoma

- ✓ Anadarko is the County Seat-Population ~6,800
- √ Total land area is ~1,290 square miles; ~12 of which
 is water
- √ As of the 2010 Census, total county population is ~30,000; ~40% is American Indian
- ✓ Median Income-~\$27, 347; ~30% below the poverty line
- ✓ Since 2007, Caddo County has had the most federal disasters declared in the country (16)

- ✓ Home to the Kiowa, Delaware, Apache & Wichita (Anadarko), Fort Sill Apache (Apache), & Caddo (Binger) Tribal Complexes
- ✓BIA Regional & Area Offices & IHS Facilities
- ✓ Riverside Indian School-Nation's oldest federally operated Indian Boarding School & 1 of 4 still open
- ✓ Main industries are tribal government, agriculture and energy
- ✓4 municipal Fire Departments & 22 VFD

ARE YOU TRAINED?

Incident Command System (ICS)-standardized on-scene incident management concept designed specifically to allow responders to adopt an integrated organizational structure equal to the complexity and demands of any single incident or multiple incidents without being hindered by jurisdictional boundaries.

National Incident Management Systems (NIMS)-Standardized approach to incident management developed by the Office of Homeland Security

UTILIZING ICS

ICS IS NOT JUST FOR EMERGENCIES

The ICS system can be used for:

planned events: parades, pow-wows, sporting events, etc.

or

unplanned events: natural disasters, Acts of God, etc.

ARE YOU ORGANIZED?

- Is your staff trained?
- Does your tribe have a resolution in place to adopt NIMS/ICS?
- Is your paperwork in order? (IAPs, MOAs, MOUs etc.)
- Is your ICS staff in place? (Incident Commander, PIO, Safety, Liaison, Planning, Logistics, Finance, Operations and Intel)
- > Do you have an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)?
- > Do you have a Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP)?
- Do you have any plan at all?
- Do you drill?

*But only for emergency preparedness, not for fracking or other Environmentally harmful purposes.

Unless you are organized with a FEMA approved EOP & HMP <u>AND</u> NIMS compliant, your tribe will <u>NOT</u> be eligible for federal disaster relief funding.

EMERGENCY OPERATION PLANS

- Identifies Command Staff
- > Includes goals and objectives for how your tribe will respond
- during disasters and emergencies
- Clearly defines your emergency response team's responsibilities
- > Identifies any regulations included in your plan
- > Include all tribal buildings and enterprises within the plan
- > Include sacred and historical sites
- > Identifies available resources

WHAT ARE YOUR RESOURCES?

Shelter
Vehicles
Supplies
Funding
Manpower

Sometimes you are the only available resource!

Do NOT offer resources if you cannot come through

"NEVER, EVER, EVER, EVER, EVER, EVER, EVER, EVER, EVER SELF DEPLOY!!"

-Every NIMS Instructor since the beginning of time

TRIBAL DISADVANTAGES

- Unorganized
- Inherent mistrust of the federal government and its programs
- > Lack of acknowledgement
- > Lack of understanding
- Lack of awareness
- > Turnover
- > Politics

TRIBAL ADVANTAGES

- Sovereign Nations
- Tribal Leader can contact the President of the United States directly for a federal disaster declaration
- Do not have to wait on the state government
- Funds can be utilized within the tribal jurisdictions which can sometimes cover many counties
- > Better understanding of tribal members' needs
- Can organize tribal PDs & FDs

NETWORKING

- > Meet with the local agencies and other local tribes
- > Always keep your contact list current
- > Partner with volunteer and/or charitable organizations
- Know who is trained within your tribal population (Doctors, nurses, first responders, etc.
- > Ask to read other organization's EOP and share yours in an attempt to avoid duplicative efforts or resources
- > Know what resources are available from other organizations

JOINING FORCES

- > Inter Tribal Emergency Management Coalition (ITEMC)
- > Tribal Emergency Response Commission (TERC)
- ➤ Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPC)
- > Inter Tribal Emergency Response Commission (ITERC)
- Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)
- > State Emergency Management meetings
- > Medical Reserve Corps (MRC)
- > Oklahoma Emergency Managers Association (OEMA)

JOINING FORCES

- > Include tribal members, partners, community stakeholders & other organizations in tribal EM meetings
- > Train together
- > Keep in contact
- > Keep an updated resource list and disseminate to other agencies
- Drill together
- > Include everyone!







Preparedness starts with you!

At Home:

- >Emergency evacuation plans
- ➤ Preparedness Kits- Include at least 72 hours of supplies within your kit
- >Memorize family & friends contact numbers
- >Know where to go wherever you are!
