Case Study: Tribe Information


- The Portland Harbor Superfund Site is located in Portland, OR on the ancestral lands of six tribal communities including Yakima Nation, Grande Ronde Community, Siletz Indians, Umatilla Indians, Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs and the Nez Perce Nation.
- Six Oregon Tribal Nations signed a MOU to take part in the management of the superfund site.
- NPL documents of interest may be available through ITEP's resource library.

EPA NPL Status Information

- Recent Site History:
 Contamination at the Portland
 Harbor Superfund Site is a
 result of industrial operations
 for more than a century. At
 least 17 industrial operations,
 have been stationed along 12
 river miles of the Willametter
 River. Contamination of
 surrounding soils, waters and
 seafood pose a risk to human
 and ecological health
 especially to those who eat
 fish found in Portland Harbor,
 such as bass, carp and catfish.
- Response activities: The site was listed on the NPL in 2000 with a HRS score of 50.00. The next step is the remedial investigation/feasibility study (RI/FS).
