








### Cayuga County Ground Water Contamination Superfund: Cayuga Nation

## Case Study: Tribe Information

The Cayuga County Ground Water Contamination Superfund is located in central New York on the eastern end of Cayuga Nation. Cayuga Nation is known as the "People of the Great Swamp." The lake holds cultural significance to multiple Tribal Nations. Community members and people from surrounding Tribes traditionally use the lake waters and wetland areas for cultural and ceremonial practices.

# EPA NPL Status Information

- Recent Site History: The Cayuga County Ground Water Contamination site consists of a plume of contaminated ground water. The contamination covers 3,050 acres from an unknown source(s).
- Response activities: The site was listed on the NPL in 2002. The HRS score of the site is 50.00. The next step is the remedial investigation/ feasibility study (RI/FS).
