PM Uncertainty Peer Review Panel

Achieving Results with Energy Efficiency: EPA's new Guidebook for Energy Efficiency Evaluation, Measurement, and Verification

Today, jurisdictions around the country continue to use proven energy efficiency policies and programs to meet electricity demand, support economic growth, and avoid generation and pollution from power plants. Every U.S. state currently administers some type of demand-side energy efficiency program, while 25 have adopted a statewide energy efficiency resource standard and others require utilities to deliver "all cost-effective energy efficiency." To ensure this \$6 billion investment is achieving intended levels of energy savings and emissions reductions, states and cities are adopting and refining requirements for evaluating, measuring, and verifying (EM&V) their energy efficiency investments. EPA's new Guidebook for Energy Efficiency Evaluation, Measurement, and Verification draws from and builds on decades of state, local, and private-sector experience

quantifying and verifying savings from energy efficiency projects and measures. The EM&V Guidebook is designed to help state, local, and tribal air and energy officials—as well as key stakeholders such as utility energy efficiency implementers—learn about, establish, or refine their EM&V approaches. The EM&V Guidebook can also help air officials understand the basics of EM&V and work with their energy counterparts to capture the air quality and public health benefits of these existing investments. The guidebook is also designed to:

- Describe key EM&V topics, methods, and approaches
- Ensure that customer-funded EE policies and programs are achieving intended results in a cost-effective manner
- Ensure that EM&V is carried out in a well-documented, rigorous, and consistent manner

The EM&V Guidebook may also help jurisdictions who want to collaborate on air and energy goals, evaluate the resulting air and energy impacts, and plan new policies and programs. <u>Learn more</u> about EM&V for energy efficiency policies and initiatives

June Is National Healthy Homes Month

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) joins the <u>U.S. Department of</u> <u>Housing and Urban Development</u> (HUD) in recognizing June as National Healthy Homes Month. Take this opportunity to learn about the relationship between indoor air, housing and health. Check out the <u>resources</u> available to advocates of healthy housing. <u>EPA's Indoor Environments Division</u> shares HUD's goal of ensuring healthy homes by maintaining healthy indoor air. The following strategies will help to maintain and improve your home's indoor air quality (IAQ):

- <u>Source Control</u>—Eliminate pollution sources or reduce emissions. For example, adjust emissions from gas stoves and eliminate sources of mold and moisture.
- <u>Better Ventilation</u>—Use exhaust fans when cooking or showering.

• <u>Filters and Air Cleaners</u>—Change the filter in your heating/cooling system, following the manufacturer's recommendations. Using an air-cleaning device also may be an option.

You can improve your home's air quality by <u>using "green" cleaning products</u>, <u>not</u> <u>smoking indoors</u>, <u>testing your home for radon</u> and <u>upgrading your heating and</u> <u>cooling systems</u> to be cleaner and more energy efficient, among many <u>other</u> actions.

DOI FWS Multistate Conservation Grant Program – \$6 million

Applications Due: July 26, 2019 Eligible Entities: state governments

The primary goal of the Multistate Conservation Grant Program is to provide grant funds to address regional or national priority needs (National Conservation Needs or NCNs) of the State fish and wildlife agencies (States) and their partners that are beyond the scope and capabilities of a single State. Projects awarded funding are published annually in the Federal Register. Projects funded through the MSCGP provide grant funds to address regional or national level priority needs of the States that are beyond the scope and capabilities of a single State. Indian Housing Block Grant Competitive Grants Program

On May 7, 2019, the <u>U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)</u> published the <u>Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA)</u> for the <u>Indian Housing</u> <u>Block Grant (IHBG) Competitive Grants Program</u>. This NOFA announces the availability of \$198 million for competitive grants to Indian tribes and tribally designated housing entities eligible to receive IHBG funding under the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act of 1996, as amended (25 U.S.C. 4101 et seq.).

To assist tribes in preparing their applications, HUD's Area Offices of Native American Programs (AONAPs) are holding in-person trainings on the grants program. The Office of Native American Programs (ONAP) has scheduled on-site and in-person trainings on IHBG Competitive Grants Program NOFA eligibility and requirements. The trainings will take place at all six (6) AONAP locations, as follows:

ONAP staff will provide the training and cover NOFA requirements, including threshold requirements, technical rating factors and post-award reporting requirements. There will be opportunities to ask questions. Applications are due August 8, 2019.
